

# INTRODUCTION

It is my pleasure to submit the Six Monthly Progress Report for the period January to June 2014 produced by the Australia-Pacific Technical College (APTC) Corporate and Student Services (CSS) office in response to the APTC contractual reporting responsibilities outlined in the APTC-DFAT contract and associated Scope of Services.

During this reporting period the APTC has continued to make strong progress against the strategic focus areas implemented since the commencement of Stage II and the activities being undertaken to contribute to the ongoing success of the APTC, these are:

- Sustainability ensuring the ongoing viability of the APTC project
- Business systems and processes improving operational efficiencies and customer service
- ▶ Teaching and learning support improving APTC's core business outcomes
- Communications, public relations and reach implementing a targeted, multi-level communication and marketing strategy
- Monitoring and evaluation improving reporting and better capturing the outcomes of activities

The report shows that the APTC responds to the demand for skilled and qualified workers in a range of industry sectors. The focus of the APTC continues to be to provide programs that respond to the labour market needs of the Pacific Island countries and against the APTC goals to improve participation and outcomes in:

**Training** increased supply of skilled workers in targeted sectors in the Pacific region;

**Employment** Pacific Islander women and men with Australian qualifications realise improved

employment opportunities nationally, regionally and internationally in targeted

sectors; and

Productivity increased productivity of individuals and organisations in targeted industries and

sectors.

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# **Executive Summary**

This is the third Six Monthly Progress Report and is for the period January to June 2014. The report is produced by the APTC Corporate and Student Services (CSS) office and responds to the APTC contractual reporting responsibilities outlined in the APTC-DFAT contract and associated Scope of Services. The main focus of the project is the delivery of quality training in support of regional growth and productivity by supporting Pacific Island men and women to obtain skills for work in the paid economy and to support the development of the TVET sector in the Pacific.

During the first half of 2014 APTC has continued to achieve strong outcomes against the Performance Assessment Framework and Scope of Services contractual requirements. The report shows that APTC is on track to deliver an increased target of 4200 graduates. Feedback from APTC Student Tracer surveys report that 91% of graduates were satisfied with their course and that graduates continue to have high employability with 92% in employment at the time of the survey. Eighty-six percent of employers surveyed reported that graduates had improved the work standards of other employees or improved the productivity of their organisations.

In line with the Business Strategies and Key Initiatives the report confirms that the APTC has delivered a number of strategic outcomes. These have included:

- expansion of existing partnerships with Pacific TVET institutions to support capacity and capability development
- signed new training partnership agreements with TVET and industry partners
- continued to implement the aims and objectives of the APTC Nationalisation Strategy
- continued to implement the Business Development Strategy and Commercialisation Strategy
- improved business processes and systems
- reviewed the language, literacy and numeracy program
- implemented the APTC Communications Strategy
- improved monitoring and evaluation outputs and undertaken Value for Money research

APTC has expanded training delivery across campuses and locations. This has been achieved within the contractual requirements of the project. In addition there has been a strong investment in building the APTC workforce and to having a stronger presence of Pacific Islanders in the workforce. Development of the APTC Training Profile continues to be strongly linked to the specific labour requirements of participating Pacific Island countries.

APTC has contributed to the strengthening of the local TVET institutions and supported the development of TVET qualification frameworks in the Pacific with the provision of capacity and capability development strategies and support

# **Report Summary**

#### Introduction

Delivering quality training in support of regional economic growth and productivity continues to be the key focus of the Australia-Pacific Technical College (APTC). This six monthly report has adopted the format introduced for the 2013-2014 Annual Report and Plan (ARP).

The report focuses on the strategic activities that are contributing to the ongoing success of the APTC and addresses the mandatory reporting requirement to report against the Performance Assessment Framework (PAF). The reporting structure reflects the APTC Business Strategies and Key Initiatives implemented since the commencement of Stage II and the activities being undertaken to contribute to the ongoing success of the APTC are centered on:

- Sustainability ensuring the ongoing viability of the APTC project
- Business systems and processes improving operational efficiencies and customer service
- ▶ Teaching and learning support improving APTC's core business outcomes
- Communications, public relations and reach implementing a targeted, multi-level communication and marketing strategy
- ▶ *Monitoring and evaluation* improving reporting and better capturing the outcomes of activities

### Longer-term Sustainability of APTC

The major component of the long term sustainability of the APTC will be the ability to develop partnerships. In the main, these partnerships will be with Pacific TVET institutions and industries. These will have a major focus on the development of capacity and capability within these organisations to deliver quality TVET programs, products or services.

The increased capability of Pacific TVET institutions will enable an increased confidence in the delivery of the qualifications frameworks operating across the Pacific. This will support a shift in the training profile of APTC to provide pathway programs for the higher level skills gap training at the Certificate III and above level to be delivered by APTC.

In this reporting period there has been continued development across all partnership agreements as well as the development of a number of new partnerships with: Ahopanilolo Technical Institute in Tonga, University of South Pacific in Fiji, Palau Community College, European Union Support for the Sugar Industry Program (SSIP) and the Textile Clothing and Footwear Council in Fiji.

The Nationalisation Strategy continues to be implemented with an increase in the number of national trainers. At 30 June 2014 there were seven national trainers: five in Fiji and two in Samoa. By the end of 2014 there will be a total of twelve national trainers: seven in Fiji, two in Samoa and three in Vanuatu. A total of twenty-one national trainers are planned for appointment by 30 June 2015: twelve in Fiji, four in Samoa, three in Vanuatu and two in PNG.

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To support newly appointed national trainers in the delivery of classes, as well as backfilling in case of illness and for succession planning purposes the creation of a new classification - Trainer Support Assistant has been implemented.

The biannual tutor reclassification process was completed in February 2014. All tutors eligible for reclassification have been provided with a contract variation, with seventeen tutors being reclassified during the review.

The APTC Business Development Strategy (BDS) is the third critical element for the long term sustainability of the APTC. This strategy was reviewed for presentation to the DFAT-APTC Advisory Group (AG) meeting in May 2014. This strategy has continued to achieve outcomes against targets during this reporting period.

#### Business systems and processes

All approved documents now reside on the APTC SharePoint site which is facilitating easier remote site access, and enhancing system functionality by allowing users to interactively input, download and track documents.

The Customer Relationship Management (CRM) system and the student results system EduPoint have been operational for twelve months and now form the platform for the management and reporting of student data for APTC. All historical student data from TAFE Queensland East Coast and Box Hill Institute student administration systems has been transferred into the APTC EMIS. The data transfer exercise revealed a number of issues with data inconsistencies, and the CSS Data Team has now reconciled all data.

# Teaching and learning support

The new Learning Support Facilitators (LSFs) are now in place and have developed a strong Community of Practice (CoP). The new LLN tests are providing a higher level of diagnostic information which enables LSFs to work collaboratively with vocational trainers to implement an integrated approach to the delivery of LLN support. The diagnostic information is provided to trainers at the commencement of classes and the LSF and vocational trainer are able to jointly develop strategies for ensuring targeted support is provided to all students.

The LMS platform MyVillage has been utilised extensively for staff and APTC partners professional development activities. It has been used to deliver the training to meet the new compliance requirement for all academic staff to hold a unit in LLN practice.

New Communities of Practice have been established in each teaching area to facilitate online communication, sharing of resources, moderation and continuous improvement for teachers working in similar vocational areas across the region. The increased staff utilisation of MyVillage for individual professional development provides an excellent foundation as MyVillage is rolled out to appropriate student groups.

The capacity of vocational trainers to support LLN has been increased with the majority undertaking accredited LLN training through the LLN Bytes course using the MyVillage resource. Most trainers and tutors completed TAELLN401A, and a number are also in the process of completing the Diploma level TAELLN501B unit.

The Alumni Strategy has been developed and outlines the current direction for the alumni. Chapters are established in a number of countries and form a network across the Pacific. The Chapters are organised to: connect alumni back to the College by keeping them informed, engaged, and involved in the alumni network and the College; offer relevant programs and services to alumni including opportunities for fellowship, socialising, professional development and networking; assist and support APTC Alumni Association in its overall mission and goals and promote APTC in each Chapter's community.

Samoa alumni are trialling a buddy system where alumni members "adopt" international students while they are in Samoa. The students are invited to the family for meals, church services, weekends, etc. Alumni believe this is a way they can contribute to the current student body. They also believe that loneliness and boredom can be overcome with this initiative.

# Communications, public relations and reach

The Communications Strategy is in place with the initial focus of the Implementation Plan being: the increase of tuition fee places through a marketing plan for targeted industry sectors and the development of an end to end approach to customer service - from application to alumni. Changes are ensuring responsiveness, competence, sensitivity and consistency.

APTC has completed the rebranding of existing documentation and promotional material to reflect the move from Australian Aid to DFAT.

An internal promotion plan has been completed for Vanuatu and includes the production of course brochures and associated printed materials and promotional activities utilising the APTC web site and other media outlets. The plan also includes sessions to provide industry-specific course information and participation in industry and community events.

APTCs social media presence has continued to improve: LinkedIn has 253 followers, YouTube has 323 views, Facebook has over 1000 "Likes" and APTC Alumni Facebook which was launched on 14 March 2014 has 331 followers.

### Monitoring and evaluation

In this reporting period the APTC has continued to achieve strong outcomes against the Performance Assessment Framework and Scope of Services contractual requirements. The report shows that APTC is on track to deliver an increased target of 4200 graduates. Feedback from APTC Student end of course surveys continue to report high levels of satisfaction with their course delivery and content and student services.

The APTC Training Profile (TP) provides a single source of information for program delivery. The TP is adjusted to meet emergent training demands and delivery amendments, with only the most current version of the profile available for use.

Two of the three programs identified in the feasibility studies undertaken to inform the expansion of the APTC Health and Community Services training profile have commenced. They are: Certificate III in Allied Health Assistance/Certificate III in Health Services Assistance and the Certificate IV in Community Development.

The third program identified in the feasibility studies was Certificate III in Nutrition and Dietetic Assistance and this program is planned to commence in Samoa on 14 July 2014.

In addition, in semester two 2014 there will be an expansion of programs in Solomon Islands to deliver the following:

- Certificate III in Formwork/Falsework
- Certificate III in Automotive Technology (Light Vehicles)
- Certificate III in Children's Services.

As a consequence of the information provided to APTC by the longitudinal study report produced by the National Centre for Vocational Education Research (NCVER), APTC commissioned a Value for Money (VfM) assessment to provide an evaluation of APTC's impact in the Pacific. The VfM was produced by the Effective Development Group and was made available to APTC during this reporting period.

VfM is a term used to assess whether or not an organisation has obtained the maximum benefit from the goods and services it both acquires and provides, within the resources available to it. It not only measures the cost of goods and services, but also takes account of the mix of quality, cost, resource use, fitness for purpose, timeliness, and convenience to judge whether or not they constitute good value.

The VfM assessment report confirmed that APTC is delivering on its outcome targets and is deemed to be effective in its operation. An assessment of cost effectiveness between both project stages and both results streams showed that the cost of direct training provided by APTC has decreased between Stage I and Stage II.

# **SECTION 1.0 – SUSTAINABILITY**

(Scope of Services 2.2 (j), 7.3, 10.1-10.5, 15.2, 5.15, 5.16, 5.17, 9.1, 9.2 8.9, 15.2 (b))

The ongoing focus on sustainability to reduce the longer term reliance of the APTC on aid funding is being operationalised through increased emphasis on partnership development, expansion of supportive initiatives for the TVET sector and the continued implementation of the nationalisation and business development strategies.

# 1.1 Partnerships

APTC has continued the development of partnerships across the Pacific, with a view to contributing to the enhancement of TVET capacity, both in professional expertise and in facilities development. The status of each partnership agreement is outlined in the Annex 3.0 - Status of Partnership Agreements.

During this reporting period there has been a strengthening of existing partnerships with additional student enrolments, and expenditure dedicated to facilities upgrade and renewal. New partnerships have also been a focus with the signing of agreements with University of the South Pacific in Fiji, Ahopanilolo Technical Institute in Tonga, Palau Community College, DFAT to deliver the EU Support to the Sugar Industry Program (SSIP) and the Textile Clothing and Footwear Council of Fiji (TCFC).

# 1.1.2 Ongoing Partnerships

#### **Don Bosco Technical Institute (DBTI)**

The Don Bosco partnership has been cemented with the enrolment of two groups of students into the Certificate II in Automotive Technology (twenty-six students) and the Certificate II in Construction (twenty-two students) programs with APTC. These students will be eligible to apply for entry into the corresponding APTC Certificate III programs which will be commencing in July 2014.

# Kiribati Institute of Technology (KIT)

The first cohort of sixteen KIT Certificate II in Carpentry graduates who completed their Certificate III in Construction in Fiji have now all gained employment. The second cohort of sixteen carpentry students have commenced their Certificate III in Construction in Fiji, and the first cohort of sixteen students studying the Certificate III in Automotive will commence in semester two 2014.

Planning is underway to establish additional training programs and pathway options for KIT graduates. Capability development programs have also been delivered in the Certificate IV in TAE for KIT staff.

# Vivekananda Technical College (VTC)

APTC signed a Memorandum of Agreement with Vivekananda Technical Centre (VTC) in Fiji in August 2013. The partnership commenced delivery of the Certificate II in Automotive Technology and the Certificate II in Cookery to VTC students in semester one 2014. Upon completion of their studies, the students will be eligible to apply for entry into the corresponding APTC certificate III programs. APTC trainers are currently working with

VTC teachers to develop resources and map competencies against the national curriculum. APTC has also provided advice regarding the development of VTC training facilities and has delivered professional development for the VTC vocational staff. In July 2014 APTC staff will support VTC in the delivery of a Competency Based Training program to all vocational training staff.

### 1.1.3 New Partnerships

### **Ahopanilolo Technical Institute (ATI)**

Discussions were conducted with the ATI regarding the delivery of a Certificate III in Aged Care/Certificate III in Health and Community Care pilot with a focus on migration outcomes to Australia. As a result of these initial discussions the pilot program is now planned for delivery in semester two 2014. APTC has been in discussion with various industry and employer groups in Australia and is hopeful that this pilot will result in overseas employment outcomes for the participants.

# **University of the South Pacific (USP)**

The APTC and the USP signed a Memorandum of Agreement at the University's Laucala campus in Suva in February 2014. This partnership reinforces APTC's goals of training, employment and productivity by working with viable partners across the region and supports several of the University's priority areas outlined in its Strategic Plan 2013-2018 such as "Regional and Community Engagement". The signing of this agreement will result in a consolidation of delivery of SHCS programs to Suva. The hospitality training previously undertaken at APTC Namaka and Rakiraki campuses will relocate to the USP site in Suva from July 2014.

#### Palau Community College (PCC)

APTC has entered into a partnership with the Palau Community College (PCC) to deliver the Certificate II in Hospitality Lodge program. APTC will work with the PCC for one semester to support the development of their capacity and capability. The program has commenced and it is anticipated up to eighteen Palau citizens will complete in September 2014. A highlight of the program will be the opportunity for students to support a range of functions at the 45<sup>th</sup> Pacific Island Forum.

#### **European Union Support to the Sugar Industry Program (SSIP)**

The European Union program has the specific objective to improve the livelihood of the Fiji sugar cane dependent populations by promoting income generation through sugar cane farming or alternatives, and improving communities' accessibility while reducing their exposure to natural risks. DFAT has been awarded the contract to conduct a Training Needs Analysis (TNA) for the sugar industry and to design and deliver subsequent relevant training across the entire sugar supply chain. APTC will deliver this program on behalf of DFAT over a four-year period. The project has commenced with the engagement of an APTC Senior Advisor, and the appointment of an officer to conduct the initial TNA in the third quarter of 2014.

In undertaking the initial components of the TNA, the APTC has established a strong working relationship with the Fiji Sugar Corporation (FSC) at the corporate level and within the four sugar mills. APTC will complete the TNA by engaging with the supply side of the sugar industry and working with

FSC to engage with the farmer advisory services, Fairtrade and growers councils with the aim to improve the productivity of the land based side of the industry. Following the TNA, training is expected to be implemented from 2015 after the 2014 sugar crushing season.

# **Textile Clothing and Footwear Council of Fiji (TCFC)**

A Memorandum of Agreement has been actioned between APTC and the Textile Clothing and Footwear Council of Fiji (TCFC) to deliver the Certificate III in Applied Fashion Design and Technology as a work-based training pilot to twenty-five existing workers in the manufacturing industry in Suva. The pilot program commenced 3 March 2014 and will conclude 24 October 2014.

All candidates in the pilot program were identified and nominated by their respective participating employers. The participating companies are Mark One Apparel, Lyndhurst, United Apparel, Classic Apparel, Performance Floatation Devices, Ranjit Garments, Intimate Apparel and Outfitters Fiji.

The success of this pilot largely depends on the participant companies' commitment to a culture of training and to an agreed scheduled release of staff to attend APTC sessions. Both parties to this MOA acknowledge that it is a shared responsibility training model.

### 1.2 Supporting the TVET Sector

# 1.2.1 Vanuatu Institute of Technology (VIT) Quality Coaching Program

To assist the Vanuatu Institute of Technology (VIT) in meeting the requirements for registration as a training provider, and to enhance the training and assessment quality improvement cycle at VIT APTC provided the services of a quality coach through its training partnership with VIT.

The coaching role supported VIT to establish a quality system to meet the requirements of the Vanuatu National Training Council (VNTC), and to develop systems and processes that ensure continuous improvement practices are being undertaken within VIT's administration, training and assessment and student services areas. The program included:

- Support to the Quality Systems Officer (QSO) in the development of quality system policies and procedures
- Coach QSO in the use of a systematic approach to quality systems set up and maintenance
- Coach QSO in audit and compliance conditions according to VNTC registration requirements and the broader needs for continuous improvement
- Support the Principal and Deputy Principals in the implementation of a quality system
- Support the QSO to monitor the implementation of policies and procedures
- Assist the QSO to develop key policies and procedures required for urgent audit rectification
- Provide advice and support to QMS users including training workshops for staff
- Provide ongoing support to the QSO using Skype and other digital technologies

Coaching was provided over a six week period. VIT have successfully designed their quality system, and policies and procedures have been implemented or reviewed. A quality management team has been established to monitor the ongoing quality improvement process. Both the APTC Country Manager Vanuatu and the quality coach were invited to provide a presentation on the process that had been implemented to support VIT to the Ministry for Education.

The model has now been further developed using funding from the Vanuatu TVET Sector Strengthening Program and expanded to other training providers across Vanuatu.

# 1.2.2 PNG Office of Higher Education

Negotiations are current underway with the Office of Higher Education to provide training for capacity development across a number of vocational areas.

#### 1.2.3 National Training Authority Registrations

APTC has all relevant registration with national training authorities for either new programs or extensions of registration.

#### Fiji National Provident Fund

APTC continues to wait for confirmation of its application to become an Approved Education Institute (AEI) in Fiji. As of June 2014, the application resides with the FNPF for consideration at their Board meeting. APTC has supplied numerous additional documents requested by the Board, and an outcome has been pending since semester two, 2013.

# **PNG National Apprenticeship and Trade Testing Board (NATTB)**

APTC has been appointed to the NATTB, and was invited to register its trainers as Trade Assessors to promote trade recognition for APTC PNG graduates. Trade Assessor training for sixteen APTC educational staff in PNG was conducted on 11 – 12 July.

### 1.3 Nationalisation Strategy

The Nationalisation Strategy continues to be implemented with an increase in the number of national trainers. At 30 June 2014 there were seven national trainers: five in Fiji and two in Samoa. By the end of 2014 there will be a total of twelve national trainers: seven in Fiji, two in Samoa and three in Vanuatu. A total of twenty-one national trainers are planned for appointment by 30 June 2015: 12 in Fiji, 4 in Samoa, 3 in Vanuatu and 2 in PNG.


The biannual tutor reclassification process was completed in February 2014. All tutors eligible for reclassification have been provided with a contract variation, with seventeen tutors being reclassified during the review. As a consequence of the nationalisation of positions expatriate trainers are either being redeployed to accommodate flexibility in the training profile or contracts are not being renewed. APTC will have actioned eight repatriations by the beginning of July 2014, with a further four outplacements instigated for national tutors due to resting of training programs. Transition plans have been introduced to support the handover of delivery from expatriate trainers to national trainers.

To support newly appointed national trainers in the delivery of classes, as well as backfilling in case of illness and for succession planning purposes the creation of a new classification - Trainer Support Assistant has been implemented. The Trainer Support Assistant position will be offered to APTC graduates only, and will be for a maximum period of twelve months. Individuals will have the opportunity to obtain the Certificate IV in Training and Assessment during this time.

The Centre for Professional Development Capability Development Priority Plan which commenced in January 2014 covers training needs for the final eighteen months of Stage II and supports the Nationalisation Strategy with capability development and capacity building activities, such as:

Certificate IV in Training and Assessment:

- six tutors in Samoa
- three tutors in Fiji
- seven tutors in PNG
- one LLN facilitator in Vanuatu

#### Training for academic staff:

- Advanced Facilitation two units from the diploma
- two LLN units from the diploma
- ▶ Advanced Assessment two units from the diploma
- Lync training across all locations

Administration staff are studying two units from the Certificate IV in Business, additional units to be offered over the 18 month period.

Individual opportunities for capability development have included:

- Painting and Decorating trainer and tutor in Australia for industry experience
- Executive Assistant shadowing a Melbourne based Executive Assistant
- two national trainers commenced online training in Project Management
- trainers and tutors completed local industry placements
- CSS staff completed a variety of work related courses both locally and in Australia

Academic staff currently participating in the following programs offered through the CPD:

- Advanced Facilitation two units from the Diploma
- Getting Online two units from the Diploma
- ▶ LLN two units from the Diploma
- ▶ TAE programs in Fiji, Vanuatu, Samoa and PNG
- coaching program for trainers

In addition, twenty-five staff completed emergent activities outside of those planned as part of the overall Capability Development Priority Plan. Over one hundred staff indicated their intention to complete units from either the Certificate IV in Business or the Diploma of VET with eighty-five currently enrolled.

# 1.4 Business Development Strategy (BDS)

The overarching principle of the BDS continues to be the full utilisation of the project budget to ensure the maximisation of TVET capacity and capability development in the Pacific by the Australian Government via the APTC program.

The BDS is a working document to guide the implementation of approved strategies and to progressively report outcomes. As such there have been a number of revisions of the BDS.

The first version of the BDS was provided to DFAT in February 2012 as an inclusion to the Annual Report and Plan 2011-2012.

The second version of the BDS was presented to, and unanimously endorsed by the DFAT-APTC Advisory Group (AG) in October 2012. A revised BDS was provided to DFAT and approved as an inclusion in the Annual Report and Plan 2012-2013 and endorsed by the AG in May 2013. The BDS was revised and endorsed by the AG at the May 2014 meeting.

It is recognised that there is potential for many unforeseen circumstances to impact on the BDS initiatives and accordingly, the APTC Management will seek DFAT approval to vary the priorities, the scope of each proposal and/or budget as circumstances require. The main elements of the BDS include:

- commercialisation strategy
- tuition fees generation
- operational efficiencies and productivity
- increased graduate target
- nationalisation strategy
- institutional partnership in Fiji USP
- Solomon Islands strategy
- PNG strategy POMTech site re-development and partnership
- Kiribati Institute of Technology (KIT) partnership agreement
- institutional partnership in Tonga
- institutional partnership in Palau

# 1.5 DFAT-APTC Advisory Group (AG)

The AG principal responsibility is to provide advice on a range of industry and TVET issues for the Pacific region to DFAT. Membership of the AG includes: representatives of Pacific Island governments, industry, industry associations and private sector organisations, Australian industry peak associations and other key stakeholders.

The most recent AG meeting was held in Vanuatu 7 - 9 May 2014, and was chaired by John Davidson, Minister Counsellor, Regional Pacific Development, Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade.

The meeting focused on the impact of the APTC program in Vanuatu and across the Pacific. AG representatives were provided with an opportunity to present training related issues pertinent to their own countries. Topics discussed included:

- local economic outlook
- local and/or regional economic development initiatives
- labour market direction and employment initiatives
- emerging growth areas
- social and economic impact of APTC on development
- TVET development

Attendees also participated in workshop sessions, providing input and insight into:

- APTC's contribution to adding value to industry, economic development and trade in Vanuatu and the Pacific
- labour mobility update, employment demand and TVET
- APTC's benefit to the Pacific and other national economies, employers and TVET
- the cost-effective options/alternatives to delivering internationally accredited TVET qualifications that are demand driven for Pacific people
- the influence of the regional and international context on the employment outcomes for APTC graduates

# SECTION 2.0 IMPROVED SYSTEMS AND PROCESSES

(Scope of Services 5.20 (b), (I-m), (p), (q))

# 2.1 APTC – Quality Management System (QMS)

The APTC - QMS contains the College policies, work instructions, forms and supporting documents. All approved documents now reside on the APTC SharePoint site which is facilitating easier remote site access, and enhancing system functionality, allowing users to interactively input, download and track documents.

In the coming semester, many of the existing policies and work instructions are due for their annual review, and these will be revised through the documented processes. This work is currently being supported by the appointment of an STA who is revising policies and procedures related to the EMIS system as well as redesigning templates to facilitate better document implementation. There has been a specific focus on the development of processes to ensure improved customer service outcomes from application lodgement to alumni (A2A).

#### 2.2 APTC Work Plan

Project objectives are tracked through the management of the APTC Work Plan, which links with the Performance Assessment Framework to provide an assessment of progress against contract deliverables.

The Work Plan is regularly updated by members of the APTC Leadership Team through the provision of Country Reports, Working Groups and LT meetings, and is employed as the prime source of information for providing APTC reports.

# 2.3 Education Management Information System (EMIS)

The Customer Relationship Management (CRM) system and the student results system EduPoint have been operational for twelve months and now form the platform for the management and reporting of student data for APTC. All historical student data from TAFE Queensland East Coast and Box Hill Institute student administration systems has been transferred into the APTC EMIS. The data transfer exercise revealed a number of issues with data inconsistencies, and the CSS Data Team has now reconciled all data.

Due to RTO system architecture the automated exchange of data is not possible, future data updates will be scheduled each semester through the software vendor Eclipse.

The Data Team continues to develop processes and work instructions to support the efficient use of the CRM and EduPoint systems. Additional training to system users will be rolled out as required.

# 2.4 Annual Policy Review Cycle

Continued work on the development of policies and work instructions has improved consistency across the College and provides clarity for all staff across aspects of the APTC business.

In this period the following policies, work instructions and forms have been developed:

# SECTION 3.0 TRAINING AND LEARNING SERVICES

(Scope of Services 2.12 (e), 5.9 (a), 5.10 (b), 5.10 (c), 5.11 (a) 5.18 (g), 5.18 (h), 5.18 (i), 5.19, 5.22, 5.23, 13.0, 14.0)

# 3.1 Learning Support Facilitators

The new LSFs are now in place and have developed a strong community of practice. The new LLN tests are providing a higher level of diagnostic information which enables LSFs to work more effectively with vocational trainers to implement an integrated approach to the delivery of LLN support. The diagnostic information is provided to trainers at the commencement of classes and the LSF and vocational trainer are able to jointly develop strategies for ensuring targeted support is provided to all students.

Under the new system of assessing against course LLN benchmarks it is expected that many courses will now be more accessible for students with lower LLN levels as the benchmarks more accurately reflect the skills needed to study the specific course. There will be a review of these outcomes towards the end of 2014 to assess the LLN changes and implement any identified improvements.

# 3.2 Learning Management System (LMS)

The LMS platform MyVillage has been utilised extensively for staff and APTC partner professional development activities over the past six months. It has been used to deliver the training to meet the new compliance requirement for all academic staff to hold a unit in LLN practice.

New Communities of Practice (CoP) have been established in each teaching area to facilitate online communication, sharing of resources, moderation and continuous improvement for teachers working in similar vocational areas across the region. The increased staff utilisation of MyVillage for individual professional development provides an excellent foundation as MyVillage is rolled out to our student groups.

### 3.3 Language Literacy and Numeracy

The capacity of staff to support LLN has been increased with the majority of teaching staff undertaking accredited LLN training through the LLN Bytes course using the MyVillage resource. Most trainers and tutors completed TAELLN401A, and a number are also in the process of completing the Diploma level TAELLN501B unit. The training focuses on identifying the LLN skills required in different vocational areas and exploring the range of support that could be provided.

The diagnostic LLN data available from the new initial LLN test is compiled into a Learner Profile that is available before the start of classes. This enables the trainers, tutors and LSFs to work collaboratively to identify potential issues for the whole group as well as individuals who might need additional support.

There are now Learning Support Facilitators (LSF) in Suva (2), Samoa, Vanuatu and PNG. They provide LLN support that is integrated into vocational training and targeted to the needs of the individual and the training cohort. They are also working with the vocational delivery teams to develop strategies and resources to build LLN skills. Remedial services are also being provided to assist students as required.

The LSF brings a higher level of skill to the much needed area of LL&N as previously experienced. This position brings higher diagnostic skills, particularly in the area of English language and writing skills. LSFs will undergo professional development to build their capacity to support vocational numeracy.

Under the new model of support, the role of the LSF is very different from that of the previous LLN tutor role. Previously the LLN tutors worked to either build general LLN skills in everyone, regardless of need, and/or to help individuals who needed to resubmit assessments. The role of the LSF is much more pro-active. They are involved in the planning of delivery and work alongside the trainers and tutors to build the LLN skills needed for the workplace. For this to happen they need to learn as much as possible about the industries they support and be seen as an LLN advisor as well as a learning facilitator. The responsibility for the development of the LLN skills lies with the whole delivery team – not just the LSF. A professional development resource was developed on MyVillage to build the competence of trainers and tutors to support and develop the LLN skills of learners. This resource also allowed APTC to meet future compliance requirements.

# 3.4 Scholarship Activity Summary

Cross-cutting themes of isolation, gender and disability are captured in the selection process for scholarship, applicants from rural/isolated locations, those with disability and females and males in non-traditional trades receiving priority.

Three successful scholarship rounds were completed in this six month period (January – June) resulting in 557 approved applicants for the School of Hospitality and Community Services and 129 approved applicants for the School of Trades and Technology courses. Not all approved scholarships will be offered immediately but the pre-approved list creates efficiencies, assists recruitment planning, and enables top-up offers to be made when deferrals or declines are received or course start dates are brought forward.

The current Scholarships and Procedures Manual is located on APTC SharePoint and has been separated into a Scholarship Policy and a Scholarship Work Instruction.

### 3.5 Training Resources

APTC has distributed hospitality learning resources (books and CD packages) to our TVET partners in Fiji, Samoa, Vanuatu, Papua New Guinea and the Solomon Islands. The resources have been generously donated to APTC by Reinhold Forster, CEO of Futura Group Pty Ltd. Futura is well known for its internationally acclaimed hospitality training resources engaging students and facilitating quality training.

# 3.6 Training Facilities

#### Fiji

APTC operates utilising MOA's or commercial lease arrangements for its operations, except in Fiji, where there are decentralised facilities. Some programs have delivery from leased premises and others such as FNU Narere and Walu Bay operate from premises owned by Fiji government entities.

After several failed attempts to locate a suitable partner and venue for the APTC electrotechnology program it was relocated to PNG. APTC has made significant improvements and upgraded the facilities of both FNU Narere and PWD Walu Bay to meet Australian qualification requirements.

#### **Rakiraki and Namaka Campus**

APTC hospitality training delivered from the Rakiraki Tanoa Hotel and Namaka campus has been relocated to Suva. The recent agreement with the University of the South Pacific (USP) facilitated the relocation to the USP Suva campus. The move will occur during the academic mid-year break, with delivery recommencing in Suva in late July 2014.

#### **Corporate and Student Services**

The extension of the CSS office has been completed, enabling an expansion of the CPD training room, which can now accommodate up to twenty-four students.

#### **Vanuatu Campus**

Minor works at the Vanuatu campus have been completed to increase space for staff and to refurbishment the toilet facilities to service the larger student cohort.

#### **Solomon Islands Campus**

The planned refurbishment of Don Bosco Institute in the Solomon Islands is underway. The carpentry Skills Barn to be used for the Certificate II in Construction program has been ordered and will be installed in the coming months.

The setback in the construction of the Skills Barn was due to the floods that ravaged Honiara in April 2014. At the time of the floods the DBTI facility was used as an evacuation and relief centre. During this time a highlight for the APTC construction students was the opportunity to support the community by constructing a playhouse, see-saw and sand pit for displaced children in the centre.

# **Samoa Campus**

The kitchen facilities in Samoa have been upgraded to comply with Australian training package requirements. The fabrication workshop has been extended, with much of the labour and skills provided by APTC students and graduates.

A second teaching workshop for refrigeration and air conditioning training will soon be made available, with double classes scheduled to commence in semester two, 2014.

#### **PNG Campus**

The PNG campus is now the established APTC electrotechnology training centre, with all delivery of the Certificate III in Electrotechnology being from this facility. The addition of a mezzanine floor to an existing workshop will enable the delivery of up to three concurrent blocks.

Construction is now complete at Port Moresby Technical College (POMTech), with training in the Certificate III in Cookery planned to commence on site in early July 2014, increasing to double block delivery in 2015. Hospitality training will be delivered from the facility from August 2014.

An additional eighty beds for student accommodation will be available for occupation by July 2014.

PNG staff has relocated to the Ravuvu site, creating more space on the POMTech site for additional classrooms and a Resource Materials Centre.

# 3.7 Cross Cutting Implementation

Staff induction and orientation programs have been reviewed and updated this semester and include all cross cutting development issues. Induction of students and staff introduces everyone to access and equity best practice and information. The Student Handbook 2014 is utilised in all locations in all study programs and is accessible via the APTC website. All APTC promotional material reflects the principles of access and equity, and cross-cutting development priorities.

The scholarship selection process has been recently reviewed to improve cross-cutting considerations in the evaluation of student applications.

Student and staff induction plans, APTC Code of Conduct requirements, the 2013 Student Handbook, and the Student Pastoral Care Program have all been reviewed and incorporate cross-cutting issues.

#### 3.8 Alumni

The Alumni Strategy has been developed and outlines the current direction for the alumni. The aim of the strategy is to increase the efficiency and effectiveness of alumni to maximise opportunities for members, the College, and the wider community and to enhance awareness of APTC.

The strategy outlines six strategic goals:

- improve the efficiency and effectiveness of the Alumni Association/Chapters
- develop an electronically connected community to improve communication, recognise current students as future alumni and increase engagement with recent graduates
- support and expand professional networking/development opportunities for alumni members
- integrate alumni in APTC activities to support building brand awareness and enhance reputation across the Pacific region
- enhance alumni visibility and awareness

#### 3.8.1 Alumni Chapters

Chapters are established in a number of countries to form a network of the alumni across the Pacific. The Chapters are organised into a unified body to achieve the following:

- connect alumni to the College by keeping them informed, engaged, and involved in the alumni network and the College
- offer programs of relevance and service to alumni including opportunities for fellowship, socialising, professional development and networking
- assist and support APTC Alumni Association in its overall mission and goals
- help promote APTC in each Chapter's community

# 3.8.2 Alumni Buddy System

Samoa alumni are trialling a buddy system where alumni members "adopt" international students while they are in Samoa. The students are invited to the family for meals, church services, weekends, etc. Alumni believe this is a way they can contribute to the current student body. They also believe that loneliness and boredom can be overcome with this initiative.

# SECTION 4.0 COMMUNICATIONS AND PUBLIC RELATIONS

(Scope of Services 5.2, 5.3)

# 4.1 Highlights

During this reporting period there have been a number of events highlighting APTCs achievements:

- Parliamentary Secretary to Minister for Foreign Affairs Senator Mason joined with Mr Wini Leka, the First Assistant Secretary TVET in the PNG National Department of Education to conduct the ground-breaking ceremony for the Port Moresby Technical College National Automotive Training Centre, jointly funded by the Australian and Papua New Guinea Governments. Senator Mason commented that: "the APTC shows what can be achieved when governments, development partners, employers and higher learning institutions combine the best that each has to offer, leading to internationally recognised trade qualifications for students and national developments for PNG and the Pacific region."
- a group of PNG APTC Carpentry students completed their training in May 2014. This group, previously unemployed, have been accepted to take up employment with Avenel Engineering Services at their project site Tabubil
- Certificate III and IV in Hospitality graduate Florence Thomas, employed by the Holiday Inn Group in Vanuatu, is being sponsored by her employer to work at the Holiday Inn on the Gold Coast in Queensland, this opportunity will provide valuable work experience and enhance Florence's knowledge and skill
- APTC Samoa hospitality and commercial cookery students served a full buffet breakfast for 300 people attending the ANZAC Day Dawn Service hosted by the Australian High Commission and New Zealand High Commission. This included the President, Prime Minister and other dignitaries
- APTC tourism Vanuatu teamed up with William Angliss TAFE tourism students from Melbourne to host a tourism familiarisation tour of Vanuatu in June 2014. A group of Certificate III in Tourism students funded their own visit to Vanuatu as part of their studies at William Angliss and familiarised themselves with Vanuatu as a tourism destination. APTC students organised tours and transfers for the group and had their skills assessed as part of this activity.

#### 4.2 Communications

APTC impact studies are nearing completion. All twenty impact studies are expected to be completed by the end of August 2014.

The Communications Strategy is in place with the initial focus of the Implementation Plan being the increase of tuition fee places through a marketing plan for targeted industry sectors and the development of an end to end approach to customer service, from application to alumni, ensuring responsiveness, competence, sensitivity and consistency.

APTC has completed the rebranding of existing documentation and promotional material to reflect the move from Australian Aid to DFAT.

An internal promotion plan has been completed for Vanuatu and includes the production of course brochures and associated printed materials and promotional activities utilising the APTC web site and other appropriate media outlets. The plan also includes sessions to provide industry-specific course information and participation in industry and community events.

# 4.3 Media and PR Activity

Sixty-four media articles, including twenty-eight web stories promoting student activities and campus events, have been released and have been uploaded onto the APTC Internet site in this period.

APTC has over 1000 "Likes" on Facebook, emanating from Fiji, PNG, Australia, Samoa, Solomon Islands, New Zealand, Vanuatu, Tonga, USA, Kiribati, Nauru, Marshall Islands, Singapore, Pakistan, Tuvalu, India, Ghana, Malaysia, Sweden, Tanzania, Zimbabwe, Morocco, Ethiopia, Palau, Congo, Philippines, Nepal, Indonesia and United Kingdom. #### **APTC Alumni Facebook**

The APTC Alumni Facebook page was launched at the APTC Nadi Graduation 14 March 2014 and the page now has a total of 331 followers.

# SECTION 5.0 MONITORING AND EVALUATION

(Scope of Services Section 2.12 (a), 2.12 (b), 5.20 (b), 5.25, 5.26, 5.27, 6.0, 6.1, 6.2, 6.3, 6.4, 6.5, 7.1, 11.1, 11.3, 16.0, 16(2) (a) ii))

Following from the Annual Report and the most recent Quarterly Report, student activity data is now aggregated by country of citizenship across applicable data sets.

Reporting requirements continue to be actioned in accordance with the Scope of Services and DFAT contractual requirements. The following reports have been presented to DFAT during this period:

- Annual Report and Plan (January)
- Quarterly Financial Report (April)
- Quarterly Activity Report (April)
- APTC Environmental Scan 2014

The End of Course Learner surveys continue to be undertaken with all completing classes, while the 2014 Graduate Student Tracer Survey and the 2014 Employer Survey are currently being conducted. The survey outcomes will be compiled in semester two, with the completed reports supplied to DFAT within the required timelines. Close management of recent surveys has seen a marked improvement in the survey return rate, making the evaluation of the data more statistically reliable.

Compilation of data from the End of Course Learner Surveys for the January – June period is contained within this report.

# 5.1 Student Activity Data

The collation of Student Activity Data is used to measure the progress of APTC against the requirements outlined in the Scope of Services and is referenced to inform College decision making processes. The student data contained in this report was drawn solely from the Educational Management Information System (EMIS), without recourse to the previously utilised BLUE database. The transition of data from the BLUE database and from parent RTO student administration systems (ISAS and SMART) was completed in May 2014, with all historical records now available on the APTC EMIS for the first time. The improved accessibility of data will ensure improved response times, increased reliability of data sets and improvements in APTC reporting. Throughout the data transition process, there was a significant focus on confirming and updating details held in the BLUE database, resulting in a more accurate student activity profile across stages I and II.

The following analysis provides an update from the information provided in the Quarterly Activity Report for the period January - March 2014. A compilation of the outcomes and the supporting data tables for the period to 30 June 2014 are contained in the tables in Annex 2.0.


# 5.1.1 Cumulative Enrolment Results (Annex 2.0 – Table 1)

In total 8715 students have been enrolled into APTC programs to date; 4437 in Stage I and 4278 in Stage II. The total enrolments for Stage II represent an increase of 1036 in this reporting period. Overall the gender balance of enrolments stands at 39% females and 61% males. In Stage I females accounted for 36% of all enrolments; for Stage II females represent 40% of all enrolments to date.

In terms of scholarship enrolments; 75% of the students enrolled are APTC scholarship recipients. The gender balance amongst APTC scholarship students is 41% female and 59% male. In Stage I, 41% of all scholarship awardees enrolled were females; for Stage II females represent 41% of all scholarship awardees to date.

Non-scholarship students in Stage II are predominantly employer funded by industry or self or privately funded.

# 5.1.2 Graduate Outcomes (Annex 2.0 – Table 2)

In total 6208 students have graduated from APTC programs to date; 3531 in Stage I and 2677 in Stage II. The overall gender balance of graduates is 42% females and 58% males. In Stage I, females accounted for 40% of all graduates; for Stage II females have represented 44% of all graduates to date. In the six month period January – June 2014, 535 students have graduated from APTC, whilst 926 have been enrolled and 671 scholarship students have been mobilised.

In terms of scholarship 79% of all graduates were recipients of an APTC scholarship in Stages I and II. For Stage I, 78% of graduates were scholarship recipients whilst for Stage II, 81% of the graduates were scholarship recipients. Females account for 45% of all scholarship graduates - 43% in Stage I and 47% in Stage II to date.

# 5.1.3 Graduate Employment and Destination Outcomes (Annex 2.0 – Table 3a)

Overall 156 graduates have migrated from their countries of residence/citizenship following completion of their study with APTC.

In Stage II, there have been 74 graduate migrations recorded to date, with graduates from Samoa comprising 32% and Fiji 24% of all migrations. The most popular destinations are New Zealand (32%), Australia (18%) and the United States of America (11%).

# 5.1.4 Migrated Graduate Qualifications (Annex 2.0 – Table 3b)

The highest numbers of migrants in Stage II are graduates of the Certificate IV in Training and Assessment (12%) and Certificate III in Hospitality (12%), then Certificate III in Patisserie (9%), Certificate III in Tourism (8%) and the Certificate III in Hairdressing (8%). These courses collectively represent 49% of all migrations in Stage II.

Graduates from the School of Trades and Technology accounted for 26% of all migrations, and the School of Hospitality and Community Services accounted for 74%.

# 5.1.5 Scholarship and Non-Scholarship Applications (Annex 2.0 – Table 4)

In total 16340 students have applied for a scholarship award to assist with the costs of studying at APTC; 9022 in Stage I and 7318 in Stage II. Overall the gender balance of applications is 43% females and 57% males. A further 1869 applicants in Stage I and 293 applicants in Stage II did not record a scholarship preference in their applications.

In APTC Stage I, females accounted for 43% of all applicants; in Stage II females represent 44% of all applicants. The campus countries generally recorded higher numbers of applications with Fiji leading the list in both stages.

# 5.1.6 Scholarship Mobilisations (Annex 2.0 – Table 5)

1840 students have been mobilised in Stage II, accounting for 41% of all APTC mobilisations to date. Of these, 43% are female. Mobilisations for the School of Hospitality and Community Services account for 58% of the total Stage II mobilisations.

# 5.1.7 Scholarship Non-Mobilisations (Annex 2.0 – Table 6a)

In total 270 scholarship award recipients have not mobilised to commence study in an APTC program to date; 199 in Stage I and 71 in Stage II. Reasons provided for non-mobilisation include declining the scholarship offer, not presenting for mobilisation and applicants who deferred study on more than one occasion. Overall, females accounted for 34% of the non-mobilisation of scholarship awards; Stage I – 23%, Stage II – 53% to date.


# 5.1.8 Scholarship Non-Completions (Annex 2.0 – Table 6b)

In total 632 APTC scholarship award recipients started their respective courses but did not complete them; 310 in Stage I and 322 in Stage II to date. Students were recorded as non-complete due to expulsion, personal reasons, ill health or non-progression in study. Overall, females accounted for 30% of the recorded non-completions after enrolment/mobilisation for scholarship awardees; Stage I – 40%, Stage II – 20% to date.

# 5.2 Student Satisfaction Surveys

#### 5.2.1 APTC Graduate Student Tracer Survey and the Employer Survey

The APTC Graduate Student Tracer Survey and the Employer Survey reports summarise feedback received from former students of APTC, and their employers. Data for the surveys is collected annually through the administration of questionnaires to the relevant student groups. Satisfaction with APTC training has remained high across survey periods; this is reflective of the quality of training received by students, and their enhanced productivity on return to the workplace. The graph below indicates the continuing satisfaction levels in the previous six months.



# 5.2.2 APTC End of Course Learner Surveys

Results from the End of Course Learner Surveys conducted since the last report show an overall satisfaction rate with course and content delivery of 91%. Additionally, 86% of students were satisfied with the quality of student support services. These results were based on surveys of 618 students. The level of response achieved represents a 100% survey completion rate. The courses which were surveyed are listed below:

# 5.3 Training Profile Research and Planning

# 5.3.1 Demand Driven Training and TVET Delivery

The APTC Training Profile (TP) provides a single source of information for program delivery. The TP is adjusted to meet emergent training demands and delivery amendments, with only the most current version of the profile available for use. The TP is utilised to track the planned delivery of classes and also informs the financial planning and forecasting processes for APTC.

The 2014 - 2015 training profile was determined by evaluating information and evidence collected at the Strategic, Regional; Country and School levels. Sources used to inform the profile include:

- Scope of Services and Document Design
- APTC Advisory Group
- feedback from students and individual employers
- employer associations
- PIF Country economic indicators
- 2014 e-Scan

#### 5.3.2 New Programs Commenced

Two of the three programs identified in the feasibility studies undertaken to inform the expansion of the APTC Health and Community Services training profile have commenced. They are:

### HLT32412 Certificate III in Allied Health Assistance / HLT32512 Certificate III in Health Services Assistance

This course is the first health course delivered by APTC and is being delivered in response to the identified significant need for health training across PIF countries, especially in Allied Health. This program will continue to June 2015.

### Certificate IV in Community Development

The skills obtained in the Certificate IV in Community Development in Vanuatu assists community members to work together to influence and guide the future of their community. Students learn how to provide a holistic approach to client needs, including social, emotional, psychological and practical support.

Students in the program participate in a broad range of placement activities, three students of the current group have volunteered at the Department of Meteorology and are putting together care packages for Cyclone Luisi affected communities and individuals.

A range of community projects are underway as a component of the work placement program, these include:

- Crime Prevention Week for the Black Sands Community
- piloting of the Disaster Management plan in the Erakor Half Road community
- establishment of a Poultry Project in the Erango Rango
- delivery of a week-long family protection act initiative to a village in Tanna
- establishment of an Herbarium for the Department of Forestry
- development of a "Safety in the Community Manual" for Youth Challenge volunteers
- Male Advocacy and Domestic Violence Against Women

### 5.3.3 New Programs Planned

The third program identified in the feasibility studies undertaken to inform the expansion of the APTC Health and Community Services training profile is HLT31512 Certificate III in Nutrition and Dietetic Assistance, programmed to commence in Samoa on 14 July 2014.

In addition, in semester two 2014 there will be an expansion of programs in Solomon Islands to deliver the following:

- Certificate III in Formwork/Falsework
- Certificate III in Automotive Technology (Light Vehicles)
- Certificate III in Children's Services.

# 5.4 APTC Value for Money Assessment

As a consequence of the information provided to APTC by the longitudinal study report produced by the National Centre for Vocational Education Research (NCVER), APTC commissioned a Value for Money (VfM) assessment to provide an evaluation of APTC's impact in the Pacific. The VfM was produced by the Effective Development Group and was made available to APTC during this reporting period.

VfM is a term used to assess whether or not an organisation has obtained the maximum benefit from the goods and services it both acquires and provides, within the resources available to it. It not only measures the cost of goods and services, but also takes account of the mix of quality, cost, resource use, fitness for purpose, timeliness, and convenience to judge whether or not they constitute good value.

Achieving VfM is described in terms of the four Es' - economy, efficiency, effectiveness and equity. The definition of the four Es' in the APTC context relate to:

Economy careful use of resources to save expense, time or effort

Efficiency delivering the same level of service for less cost, time or effort

• Effectiveness delivering a better service or getting a better return for the same amount of expense, time or effort

Equity how fairly the benefits of the project are distributed

The VfM assessment report confirmed that APTC is delivering on its outcome targets and is deemed to be effective in its operation. An assessment of cost effectiveness between both project stages and both results streams showed that the cost of direct training provided by APTC has decreased between Stage I and Stage II.

## **SECTION 6.0 RISK MANAGEMENT**

(Scope of Services 5.2, 5.3, 16.2(b) (viii))

#### 6.1 Business Risk

A revised APTC Risk Management Plan was presented in the APTC Annual Report and Plan 2013 – 2014, and was further updated at the LT meeting in May 2014. The revised plan more easily identifies risk levels and assigns responsibility for actions emanating from evaluation of the plan.

Risk is identified at a strategic and operational level and managed through the Leadership Team and Governance Group activities. Strategic risks form part of a monthly report to the Managing Contractor Consortium Board (MCCB), as well as operational risks that may from time to time escalate to a higher level risk status due to high ratings on both consequence and likelihood of risk occurring.

### 6.2 Environmental and Physical Risk

A review of all APTC safety handbooks occurred during this period.

The recent floods in the Solomon Islands put the APTC emergency tree procedures to the test, with all staff reported safe throughout the event. Revised staff contact lists for all locations are issued to all staff via the email network on a monthly basis.
