INTRODUCTION

It is my pleasure to submit the Six Monthly Progress Report for the period January to June 2015. The report is produced by the Australia-Pacific Technical College (APTC) Corporate and Student Services (CSS) office in response to the APTC contractual reporting responsibilities outlined in the APTC-DFAT contract and associated Scope of Services.

During this reporting period the APTC has continued to make strong progress against the strategic focus areas implemented since the commencement of Stage 2 and the activities being undertaken to contribute to the ongoing success of the APTC, these are:

- Sustainability ensuring the ongoing viability of the APTC project
- Business systems and processes improving operational efficiencies and customer service
- ► Teaching and learning support improving APTC's core business outcomes
- ▶ Communications, public relations and reach implementing a targeted, multi-level communication and marketing strategy
- Monitoring and evaluation improving reporting and better capturing the outcomes of activities

The report shows that the APTC responds to the demand for skilled and qualified workers in a range of industry sectors. The focus of the APTC continues to be to provide programs that respond to the labour market needs of the Pacific Island countries and against the APTC goals to improve participation and outcomes in:

Training increased supply of skilled workers in targeted sectors in the

Pacific region;

Employment Pacific Islander women and men with Australian

qualifications realise improved employment opportunities nationally, regionally and internationally in targeted sectors;

and

Productivity increased productivity of individuals and organisations in

targeted industries and sectors.

Executive Summary

The Six Monthly Progress Report is for the period January to June 2015. The report is produced by the APTC Corporate and Student Services (CSS) office and responds to the APTC contractual reporting responsibilities outlined in the APTC-DFAT contract and associated Scope of Services.

The role of APTC is to deliver Australian accredited Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) qualifications to citizens of Pacific Island countries. Implicit in this role is the strengthening of the TVET framework in the Pacific and the upskilling of TVET staff through partnerships with other training providers.

As the final Six Monthly Progress Report for the Stage 2 contract, it is pleasing to note that APTC has performed well against the measures contained in the Scope of Services (SoS) and Performance Assessment Framework (PAF) requirements.

As in previous periods, APTC rated positively in student and employer feedback and this was also confirmed by employer feedback received in the recent labour market surveys conducted in campus countries. A common theme throughout the surveys was the apparent value of APTC graduates as employees, and employer preference for APTC graduates when recruiting.

In line with the Business Strategies and Key Initiatives the report confirms that the APTC has delivered a number of strategic outcomes. These have included:

- positive benefits accruing to existing APTC Pacific TVET institution partners, and scope to extend these relationships into the Stage 2 Extension
- the aims and objectives of the APTC Nationalisation Strategy continue to be realised as evidenced by the increasing number of national staff relative to international staff
- implementation of the Business Development Strategy and Commercialisation
 Strategy has resulted in the achievement of commercial revenue and profit targets against contract requirements
- refined business processes and systems continue to improve efficiencies in APTC operations
- meeting all benchmarks for student and employer satisfaction indicators
- implementation of student support programs such as Communities of Practice improving student outcomes
- exceeding Stage 2 graduate targets against contract requirements
- marked increase in the percentage of tuition fee paying enrolments compared to the number of scholarships offered through APTC

There has been a substantial investment in building the APTC workforce and to having a stronger presence of Pacific Islanders engaged in the business. This focus is planned to continue into the Stage 2 Extension. The requirements of the Stage 2 APTC Training Profile have been fulfilled, and strengthened Monitoring and Evaluation requirements under the Stage 2 Extension Scope of Services will serve to reinforce the strong links between APTC course offerings and the skills needs of the businesses and workforce throughout Pacific Island countries.

Report Summary

Introduction

The Six Monthly Report for the period 1 January – 30 June 2015 demonstrates progress against contractual obligations with DFAT as defined under the SoS. The report focuses on the strategic activities that are contributing to the ongoing success of the APTC and addresses the mandatory reporting requirement to report against the Performance Assessment Framework (PAF). It is also the last Six Monthly Report required under the original Stage 2 contract.

The focus for this six months was on the consolidation of activities leading up to the finalisation of the Stage 2 contract, including the completion of training programs for all enrolled students and acquittal of financial claims and completion of financial reporting.

In this period much work has concentrated on the preparation for the change of operation to a single Registered Training Organisation (RTO), TAFE Queensland East Coast (TQEC), as well as review of the management structure and renewing the emphasis on the nationalisation of positions.

This led to the appointment of an Executive Director Training Delivery to oversee the delivery of all training programs across the College. In addition, the role of the Specialist Vocational Training Advisor has been recruited. These positions will provide specialist vocational expertise and closely aligned to course functional areas.

It is timely to reflect on the achievements of APTC in Stage 2, with the achievement of 4883 graduated students in the contract period, substantial progress towards the nationalisation of the workforce and expansion of course offerings throughout the Pacific. APTC has established valuable and long-term partnerships that bring real and quantifiable benefits to the people of Pacific Island nations.

Delivering quality training in support of regional economic growth and productivity continues to be the key focus of APTC.

The report reflects the strategies, initiatives and business structures implemented since the commencement of Stage 2. These initiatives have been reported in the following categories: sustainability, business systems and processes, teaching and learning support, communications, public relations and reach and monitoring and evaluation.

Longer-term Sustainability of APTC - ensuring the ongoing viablity of the APTC

The cornerstone of success for APTC in the Pacific is the capacity to establish and nurture beneficial partnerships with industry and TVET providers. Through the provision of the Certificate IV in Training and Assessment qualification to TVET institution employees, the APTC has been able to demonstrate the methodologies associated with competency-based training and in-depth knowledge of Australian National Training Packages throughout the region.

In Stage 2, APTC has delivered the Certificate IV in Training and Assessment qualification to 102 people employed by partner institutions. In this six-month period, trainers from the University of the South Pacific, Port Moresby Technical College, Vivekananda Technical Centre and the National University of Samoa have completed the qualification.

Existing APTC partnership agreements nominally expired 30 June 2015, in line with the Stage 2 contract period. Partnership agreements have been extended, or are in the process of being evaluated and renegotiated for the duration of the Stage 2 Extension.

The success of the partnership with the Textile Clothing and Footwear Council of Fiji (TCFC) in 2014 has resulted in a decision to extend the delivery of the Certificate III in Fashion Design and Technology to workplaces in Fiji West, based on the same workbased delivery model used in Suva.

APTC has commenced delivery of training to employees of the Fiji Sugar Corporation (FSC) as part of the European Union's "Accompanying Measures for Sugar Protocol (AMSP – 2013) – Strategic Restructuring of the Sugar Cane Industry" initiative. To date personnel have been enrolled in the Certificate IV in Frontline Management, the Certificate III in Electrotechnology – Electrician and the Certificate III in Engineering – Fabrication Trade. On-the-job training delivery occurs on site at the sugar mills in Lautoka, Ba, Rakiraki and Labasa. A suite of targeted short course skills sets for the milling and non-milling stakeholders and a customised program for Leader Farmers will be delivered across the sugar growing areas of Fiji in semester 2, 2015.

The Certificate III in Hospitality is also currently being delivered using a workbased model in PNG, in partnership with Coral Seas Hotels who are funding the tuition fees for their employees.

The Nationalisation Strategy is a major factor in ensuring the long-term sustainability of APTC, and substantial progress has been made in nationalising the workforce. The Vanuatu campus of APTC now has all delivery being undertaken by national staff.

At the time this report was completed, APTC employed 172 staff, of which 120 were Pacific Island nationals, constituting a thirty percent international and seventy percent national staffing mix.

The implementation of the APTC Business Development Strategy (BDS) and the Commercialisation Strategy has been instrumental in APTC exceeding the contracted revenue and profit targets for commercial services by approximately ten percent in Stage 2.

The registration of APTC with the Fiji National Provident Fund (FNFP) in Fiji has support a rise in Fijian applicants utilising their FNPF funds to enrol in tuition fee paying courses in Fiji. APTC continues to promote the advantages paying tuition fees has in timely access to training for individuals.

Business systems and processes - improving operational efficiencies and customer service

As part of the realignment of APTC to a single RTO - TAFE Queensland East Coast, a review of roles and functions was completed this semester. The School of Hospitality and Community Services and the School of Trades and Technology have been amalgamated under the management of the Executive Director Training Delivery.

The appointment of Specialist Vocational Training Advisors, will support increased accountability for specific training package clusters and associated compliance under the Australian Skills Quality Authority (ASQA).

As part of the Demand to Employment (D2E) project, APTC conducted labour market surveys in campus countries this semester. The analysis of these surveys will inform the composition of the APTC training profile for the next twelve months.

A subset of the D2E project was the Application to Alumni (A2A) work instruction. This work instruction details the processes to be followed in taking a candidate from the submission of an application to enrolment in a course, and has been distributed to Country Managers for implementation.

Teaching and learning support - improving APTC's core business outcomes

Established in 2014 to facilitate online communication, sharing of resources and moderation of delivery assessment, Communities of Practice (CoP) have been implemented across the Pacific for a number of functional areas.

The Individual Success Plan (ISP), encourages students to set their own goals for their study, the introduction of the ISP. The trial of the ISP in Samoa had a positive effect on student outcomes. Students reported an increased ability to focus on their studies and enhanced study outcomes.

Vanuatu campus is utilising an International Labour Organisation (ILO) resource, My Guide to Employment for Young People in the Pacific, as an effective introduction to computers for students new to this technology. When combined with support from tutors and trainers, positive outcomes are being achieved.

APTC administration staff enrolled in the Certificate IV in Business and academic staff enrolled in the Diploma of Vocational Education and Training continue to make progress towards obtaining their qualifications. During this period, a Short Term Advisor delivered competencies in both qualifications to staff at the CSS office and in campus countries. The staff were released from their normal duties for a sequence of planned day-long sessions to address the core aspects of the competencies, with participants expected to complete other learning and assessment tasks in their own time.

Communications, public relations and reach - public relations and reach - implementing a targeted, multi-level communication and marketing strategy

APTC's social media presence continues to strengthen and increase its reach: LinkedIn currently has 554 connections, more than double the number in the same period last year. APTC videos on YouTube have had 808 views, an increase of almost 500 in the past year and Facebook "Likes" have more than doubled in twelve months.

An Alumni LinkedIn page for professional development and networking has been established. A proposal was submitted to Campus Managers to encourage trainers/tutors to create topics of discussion on LinkedIn that would benefit Alumni for their professional development.

The APTC Newsletter is currently being distributed twice a year on the updated electronic template. The distribution of the e-newsletter in January also marked the launch of APTC's subscription button on its website. This allows individuals to subscribe to APTC's news stories published on the web. To date there are over 500 subscribers to this news service.

Promotional and recruitment plans are currently being prepared in consultation with the Manager Promotions and Communications (MPC) to ensure consistency across all promotion activities. The D2E project will develop processes to more closely align promotional activities with the targets set in the Annual Training Profile. Recruitment procedures have been updated with an emphasis on increasing the uptake of tuition fee places in all campuses.

Monitoring and evaluation—improving reporting and better capturing the outcomes of activities

APTC has performed well against the targets and outcomes required in the SoS and the PAF in Stage 2. The anticipated final graduate total will exceed the agreed target, and the Graduate Student Tracer Survey and Employer Survey have showed consistently strong results above the required benchmarks.

The End of Course Learners Surveys (EoCLS) for this semester have returned encouraging results, exceeding the SoS benchmarks and performing favourably in comparison to the National Centre for Vocational Educational Research (NCVER) Australian comparator for 2014. In rating the overall quality of training, APTC students recorded a 93.4% satisfaction level compared to the Australian student rating of 87.6% reported by NCVER. Similarly 94.2% of APTC graduates indicated they were satisfied with the teaching they received against an NCVER figure of 89.9%. The NCVER reported level for employment after training for Australian students was 77.6%, with APTC at 91.2%.

The annual Graduate Student Tracer Survey, and the accompanying Employer Survey will be conducted later in 2015. The surveys have been delayed in anticipation of changed reporting requirements under the revised Monitoring and Evaluation Framework in the SoS for the Stage 2 Extension.

The APTC training profile for Stage 2, planned to 30 June 2015, has been completed and training delivered. A renewed training profile is currently under development, backed by a comprehensive Labour Market Survey process and extensive research activities culminating in the APTC eScan 2015 and in-depth Country Profiles.

SECTION 1.0 – SUSTAINABILITY

(Scope of Services 2.2 (j), 7.3, 10.1-10.5, 15.2, 5.15, 5.16, 5.17, 9.1, 9.2 8.9, 15.2 (b))

For APTC, sustainable development means adopting business strategies and activities that meet the needs of all stakeholders, including Governments, businesses, communities and individuals. The strategies seek precision and practicality as the basis of planning, while recognising they must be fluid and agile, able to respond to increased information and changing demands.

Our core sustainability capabilities focus on the continued development of partnerships, support for the TVET sector in the Pacific, and in strengthening the potential of our nationalised workforce. These capabilities will, together with business development strategies designed to reduce reliance on aid funding, make APTC a sustainable long term provider of quality training in the Pacific.

1.1 Partnerships

Since the commencement of Stage 2, APTC has invested significant time and resources into developing mutually beneficial relationships with strategic partners across the Pacific. These partnerships encourage and rely on structure, accountability and collaboration, some of these have started as small agreements, building momentum over time, to create sustainable, successful outcomes for involved parties.

With the commencement of the Stage 2 Extension, APTC is in consultation with all current partners to extend existing arrangements for a minimum of six months while the revised country profiles and consultations are been completed. Where required, leases for all premises are current.

The status of each partnership agreement is outlined in the Annex 3.0 - Status of Partnership Agreements.

1.1.1 Don Bosco Technical Institute (DBTI)

Delivery of training from the DBTI site this semester saw twenty-six students complete the Certificate II in Automotive Servicing Technology, twenty-two students completed the Certificate III in Light Automotive Technology, fifteen completed the Certificate III in Light Vehicle Mechanical Technology and seventeen students completed training in the Certificate III in Formwork/Falsework.

The Skills Barn provided by the partnership agreement on the DBTI site was officially opened on 16 June and was the venue for the Solomon Islands graduation in May.

The ablution blocks donated to DBTI have been plumbed using the services of an APTC plumbing graduate, and are now operational on site.

1.1.2 Vivekananda Technical College (VTC)

As a result of the partnership five VTC trainers will soon graduate from the Certificate III in Light Vehicle Mechanical Technology. Another three VTC trainers have completed the Certificate IV in Training and Assessment with APTC.

As a valued partner, VTC trainers are now participating in APTC assessment validation sessions along with other industry representatives. The most recent validation session, stipulated under the new Standards for Registered Training Organisations (RTOs) 2015, was conducted at the Fusion Restaurant at USP, and assessments for nine competencies were validated during this

session. Involvement in these activities is an excellent professional development opportunity for VTC staff.

1.1.3 University of the South Pacific (USP)

The APTC and the USP Memorandum of Agreement is entering its second year of operation at the University's Laucala campus in Suva, with both training providers sharing the restaurant's training facilities and equipment. To date ninety-three APTC students have been enrolled to study at the Laucala campus in the Certificate III in Commercial Cookery and the Certificate III in Hospitality.

The costs of operating the training restaurant are defrayed by using restaurant revenue to support the maintenance of the venue.

APTC also joined with USP and the Ministry of Health to promote the annual USP Health Week in May. The event focussed on how to develop a healthy lifestyle on a budget, with APTC staff and students conducting cookery demonstrations for the visiting public.

1.1.4 European Union Support to the Sugar Industry Program (SSIP)

APTC is delivering this program on behalf of DFAT over a four-year period, due for completion in December 2017. A Training Needs Analysis (TNA) was conducted in 2014 to scope the skills requirements for the four Fiji Sugar Corporation (FSC) sugar mills, and the non-milling sector including the FSC Farm Advisory Service, the Lautoka and Labasa Cane Producers Associations, the Sugar Cane Growers Council, the Sugar Cane Tribunal and the Sugar Cane Research Institute of Fiji. The results of the TNA have been communicated to all stakeholders, with a training implementation plan developed and operationalised.

The project currently has four vocational trainers engaged who are delivering training in an on-the-job format. Semester 2 2015 planning is complete, with a fourth group of FSC employees enrolled in the Certificate IV in Frontline Management. Training in Electrotechnology, Instrumentation, Welding and Fabrication is ongoing. A suite of short courses has also been developed and will be delivered across the semester to meet the needs of the non-milling sectors. A customised program for delivery to Leader Farmers across Fiji has been completed and delivery will commence in semester 2 2015.

To date one hundred and five students have been enrolled in:

- Certificate III in Electrotechnology Electrician
- Certificate III in Engineering Fabrication Trade
- Certificate IV in Frontline Management

Plans for a new training centre to be built at the Lautoka mill are under development. This centre will replace the current facility and will provide a modern training facility for FSC into the future.

1.1.5 Textile Clothing and Footwear Council of Fiji (TCFC)

Following the successful delivery of the Certificate III in Applied Fashion Design and Technology under a Memorandum of Agreement (MoA) between APTC and the Textile Clothing and Footwear Council of Fiji (TCFC) in 2014, another course will be delivered under the same MoA to an industry cohort in Fiji West (Nadi-Lautoka region). The impact of the work-based training pilot conducted in Suva in 2014 has prompted the extension of this program in 2015.

All eighteen candidates in the program were identified and nominated by their respective participating employers. The participating companies are Danam, Treekams, Motiram, Nagsun, Jacks and Talei.

1.2 Supporting the TVET Sector

1.2.1 National Training Authority Registrations

All APTC registration with national training authorities across campus countries will be revised and updated from 1 July, as all program delivery is now accredited under a single Australian Registered Training Organisation (RTO) registration.

1.2.2 Fiji National Provident Fund (FNPF)

APTC has been listed as an approved institution under the education assistance provided to students who want to pay their tuition fees from the FNPF. In addition to having the opportunity to apply for a scholarship at APTC, Fijian citizens are now also able to access FNPF funding to apply as a fee-paying student, which increases the options they have for studying at APTC.

The registration with FNPF is an indication of the quality of programs offered by APTC and supports the standing of APTC as a solid organisation with strong systems and processes in place to ensure students are well-supported.

Applicants were successful in utilising FNPF monies to fund their enrolment into the Certificate IV in Training and Assessment in semester 1 2015, and semester two will see increased enrolments in a wider range of courses using this fund source.

1.2.3 POMTech

During the current partnership period eleven POMTech trainers have completed the Certificate IV in Training and Assessment while several others are in the process of completing. Two POMTech trainers have also completed the Certificate III in Electrotechnology – Electrician qualification.

The partnership is managed through quarterly meetings of the Joint Management Committee, with daily operational issues addressed through departmental heads.

1.2.4 LAE Polytechnic

Following a training needs analysis conducted by the Lae Polytechnic Partnership Agreement Centre of Excellence Steering Committee in 2014, the Certificate III in Engineering – Fabrication Trade was delivered to a group of fourteen students in semester 1 2015, with another group scheduled to commence in July 2015. The project is jointly managed by the National Polytechnic Institute (NPI) and the APTC PNG Country Manager, with APTC being provided with exclusive use of the NPI workshop facility.

1.2.5 Pathway for APTC graduates

More than twenty graduates of the Certificate III in Allied Health have been accepted by the National University of Samoa (NUS) into the Diploma of Nursing. This provides a new career pathway into the nursing profession for these graduates, as entry to the NUS qualification was previously open only to school leavers who had completed year thirteen with high scores. Entry into this program for these graduates is acknowledgement of the quality of the APTC course. Most of the APTC graduates entering the Diploma of Nursing program are women with families who would previously have not had access to this career path.

1.2.6 Post-Cyclone Pam Support

In the wake of the devastation wreaked by cyclone Pam, APTC provided support to the Vanuatu Institute of Technology (VIT) by reallocating funds originally earmarked for facilities refurbishment and maintenance, to repair and rebuild the Nambanga training restaurant and other areas of VIT.

1.2.7 Early Childhood Education and Care – Solomon Islands

APTC provided training in the Certificate III in Early Childhood Education and Care to twenty-one employees of the Solomon Islands Ministry of Education and Human Resource Development (MEHRD) this semester. The students, all residents of Malaita Province, were approved by MEHRD with the training conducted in the provincial capital of Auki. The APTC trainer was engaged to live and train in Auki, utilising local facilities for training purposes. The program, strongly supported by MEHRD, has been extended to semester 2 2015, with a further cohort from the same province due to commence training in early July.

1.2.8 Pathways to Further Education – Bougainville

Under contract with DFAT, APTC delivered the Certificate III in Pathways to Further Education to students selected to enter the Bougainville Police Service. In all, five female and fourteen male students were enrolled in the program this semester. Successful completion of this program will prepare the students to undertake training to become police officers in Bougainville.

1.2.9 Training provided to TVET related institutions:

APTC has provided the following training to TVET related institutions in the last six months:

- Samoan Qualifications Authority three courses in the Certificate
 IV in Training and Assessment delivered to seventy students
- Certificate IV in Training and Assessment course in Fiji included two self-funded participants from TVET institutes
- ▶ Tonga Ministry of Education two courses in the Certificate IV in Training and Assessment delivered to fifty students
- ▶ Tonga Emerging Leaders program short course delivered to twenty emerging TVET leaders in Tonga
- Certificate IV in Training and Assessment delivered in PNG to ten students from LAE Polytechnic, and eighteen students from TVET institutes in Bougainville

1.3 Nationalisation Strategy

The Nationalisation Strategy is progressing well for both academic and administration staff. There has been a significant improvement in key areas including a reduction of staff from 200 to 180 and the nationalisation of functions for all Australian based staff as of 30 June 2015. In May 2013 there were 18 Australia-based staff members. As of 1 July 2015 there will be no APTC staff members based in Australia, as all functions have been nationalised. In the future it is expected that Australian-based staff will only be engaged on short-term contracts to address any emergent requirements. This is a substantial efficiency outcome for APTC, and the transition of functions to APTC CSS in Fiji has also enabled greater effectiveness in processing with centralised controls.

Vanuatu is now fully nationalised at trainer level, with the only expatriate staff being the Country Manager and the recently engaged Specialist Vocational Training Advisor (SVTA).

There are currently fourteen national trainers on APTC staff – two in Samoa, three in Vanuatu and nine in Fiji. A further five tutors are expected to transition to trainer status over the coming months.

It is anticipated that recruitment of a national Training Assistant for the Community and Youth Work programs in Vanuatu will be completed in semester 2 2015.


It is anticipated that there will be significant additions to the national academic workforce in PNG by January 2016.

The tutor reclassification process has been completed as of June 2015. Integral to this process is the development of a formal Capability Development Plan for each staff member.

1.4 Business Development Strategy (BDS)

The implementation of the BDS in Stage 2 saw a significant increase in commercial revenue, enabling APTC to meet contracted Fee-For-Service (FFS) revenue targets. The emphasis on increasing the number of Tuition Fee (TF) paying students funded by employers, donors and single subscribers has seen a rise in the level of these enrolments in Stage 2.

Efforts in promoting the level of TF paying enrolments continue, with a number of TF payers accessing FNPF funds in Fiji to join APTC classes in semester 2, 2015. APTC implemented a direct recruitment campaign targeting TF payers. While successful, the campaign highlighted some administration issues in accessing FNPF funds.

The BDS also assisted in facilitating the attainment of the SoS graduate target and achieving operational efficiencies and productivity across APTC campuses.

SECTION 2.0 IMPROVED SYSTEMS AND PROCESSES

(Scope of Services 5.20 (b), (I-m), (p), (q))

2.1 Key Strategic Initiatives

The Demand to Employment (D2E) project deliverables have been assigned to Leadership Team (LT) members, with overall management responsibility accorded to the Executive Director – Strategy, Monitoring and Evaluation. A major part of the project are the labour market surveys conducted in campus countries in semester 1 2015. Once complete, the analysis of these surveys will inform the compilation of the demand-driven training profile for the Stage 2 Extension.

The Application to Alumni (A2A) work instruction has been distributed to the new Country Managers, and will guide them in the implementation of procedures in-country. The A2A document is currently under further review to reaffirm compliance with TAFE Queensland East Coast (TQEC) quality system and the impending change of the student administration system from ISAS to SMS by TAFE Queensland (TQ) in October this year.

2.2 APTC – Quality Management System (QMS)

The APTC - QMS contains the College policies, work instructions, forms and supporting documents. All approved documents now reside on the APTC SharePoint site which is facilitating easier remote site access, and enhancing system functionality, allowing users to interactively input, download and track documents.

As APTC moves under TQEC as the RTO in the Stage 2 Extension, all policies, work instructions, forms and resources will be reviewed and revised to ensure they meet audit compliance and interface with RTO documentation.

2.3 Education Management Information System (EMIS)

With the contract extension move to TQEC as the RTO for the delivery the all ATPC qualifications, June 2015 will see the last results for courses delivered under the Box Hill Institute (BHI) RTO status entered into the SMART system. These results will be back-loaded into EduPoint by the end of July, ensuring that the APTC system mirrors results held by BHI. Several courses under BHI scope are due to complete in semester 2 2015 and will be resulted in SMART and testamurs issued from BHI. Arrangements have been made to transfer these results into EduPoint at the appropriate time.

All courses previously delivered under BHI have been reassigned to TAFE Queensland East Coast, with much activity involved in transferring all of the required information into the new Training and Assessment Strategy Plan (TASP) and ISAS Delivery Package (DP) formats.

TAFE Queensland is implementing a replacement for ISAS in semester two, due to go live 26 October. The new Student Management System (SMS), is cloud-based, and promises significant advantages over the previous system. Training for CSS staff will be required to enable them to operate the system from Fiji, and will occur prior to the go live date.

2.4 Annual Policy Review Cycle

Continued work on the development of policies and work instructions has improved consistency across the College and provides clarity for all staff across aspects of the APTC business.

SECTION 3.0 TRAINING AND LEARNING SERVICES

(Scope of Services 2.12 (e), 5.9 (a), 5.10 (b), 5.10 (c), 5.11 (a) 5.18 (g), 5.18 (h), 5.18 (i), 5.19, 5.22, 5.23, 13.0, 14.0)

3.1 Validation Activities

The implementation of the new Standards for Registered Training Organisations (RTOs) 2015 introduced updated requirements and a refined definition of assessment validation processes. The SVTAs will oversee the implementation of revised validation and moderation activities by delivery teams.

Assessment validation for the Cookery and Hospitality sectors was conducted at the Pacific Fusion Restaurant, Laucaula campus Fiji and included industry representatives from the Holiday Inn, FNU, Five Princess, and Jacks, as well as our TVET partners VTC.

The Aged Care sector also participated in a validation workshop at APTC premises in Gorrie Street Suva on 16 April. This workshop was attended by industry representatives: Loraina Chung, Home of Compassion and Neelum Kumar from Samabula Senior Citizen's Home. Both representatives are in charge of their Aged care facilities and have vast experience in the Fiji Aged Care industry.

3.2 Communities of Practice

Communities of Practice (CoP) were established to facilitate online communication, sharing of resources, moderation of delivery assessment and continuous improvement for APTC trainers working in similar vocational areas across the Pacific. Most recently CoPs have commenced across the Pacific for Early Childhood Education and Care, and APTC2Work staff, chaired by the Senior Trainer, Vanuatu.

3.3 Individual Success Plan

The Individual Success Plan (ISP) program has been further trialled in Samoa in 2015. The ISP is integrated with training delivery, LLN support and APTC2Work. Each student sets goals (short and long term), identifies support needs (personal and academic), and plans their own individual study program. Teachers, tutors, LSF, counsellors and student support staff review the ISP with students and assist students in maximising their achievements. The outcomes to date have been excellent with students reporting their goal setting and related follow up activities have enabled them to focus, plan and stay on target more effectively. The ISP has been aligned with the Student Success Kit (managed by academic staff) and has provided regular checks on students' progress as well as individual support and student contract activity. There has been a marked reduction in student behavioural issues as this strategy has facilitated early identification of issues and timely responsiveness.

3.4 APTC2Work ILO Trial

As part of the recommendations of the recent review of APTC2Work, Vanuatu campus implemented a trial of the International Labour Organisation (ILO) resource, My Guide to Employment For Young People in the Pacific, a compulsory introduction to computers and the information technology system during student orientation, a non-compulsory Computer Skills program developed for those learners who were new to information technology and a comprehensive Learning Support program to support the APTC2Work initiatives.

The compulsory half-day introduction to computers during Orientation Week was delivered as part of the role of the APTC2Work tutors. This initiative reduced the stress experienced by students as they, in many cases, interact with information technology for the first time as part of

their course work. The session included an introduction to computers, an introduction to the network and how to log on, introduction to word processing and how to set up an email address. Less computer-related issues were reported by trainers throughout the semester, and students felt they could start on their work immediately without having to "learn computers first". An ongoing after-hours program was developed for students wishing to increase their skills.

The tutor reported the ILO program to be user-friendly and logical in design. It is well supported with minimal resources and easy to contextualise. Some tasks can be completed in personal time, providing flexibility. There are some tasks that require students to think critically and reflect.

Not all approved scholarships applicants will be offered immediately but the pre-approved list creates efficiencies, assists recruitment planning, and enables top-up offers to be made when deferrals or declines are received or course start dates are brought forward.

3.6 Training Resources

As part of the review of APTC compliance requirements, training resources will be evaluated to ensure they meet TQEC requirements under the new Standards for Registered Training Organisations (RTOs) 2015. Under the new standards, validation procedures are more rigorous, and there is a need to ensure that delivery resources are standardised across all locations.

3.7 Training Facilities

A stocktake specialist was engaged as a Short Term Advisor (STA) in this period to conduct a stocktake and assets tagging project across all APTC campuses. Now catalogued, future regular stocktake activities will be more efficient and accurate.

Vanuatu Campus

APTC campus buildings received little to no damage as a result of Cyclone Pam. VIT Nambanga restaurant sustained considerable damage but is now back in working order. The student computer lab at VIT was completely destroyed after the roof of the computer lab was torn off. Vila North School Campus building also received little damage while Vila North School received substantial damage to most classrooms and offices. APTC student accommodation withstood cyclone Pam very well with no damage at all.

Student internet continues to present a problem to students as it is slow and not responsive. APTC facilities staff are working with Telecom Vanuatu Limited (TVL) to connect fast fibre cable this is planned to be operational during semester 2 2015.

Equipment at Nambanga training restaurant is being repaired or upgraded, some as a result of cyclone Pam and some as part of the APTC routine maintenance program.

Solomon Islands Campus

The Skills Barn was officially opened on 16 June 2015. The Skills Barn provided and excellent venue for the recent Solomon Islands graduation.

Samoa Campus

Accommodation upgrade – APTC has negotiated with NUS for major upgrades to the facilities APTC rents for student accommodation and these are largely complete. This has included

- New stoves and fridges in each unit
- Total remodelling of the kitchens and bathrooms
- Replacement of washing lines and other minor items
- Installation of microwaves
- Audit and repair/replacement of all furniture and fittings
- Improvements to electricity supply and lighting
- Replacement of the security hut (student project Fabrication and Welding)
- Linen and curtain replacement

Quotes have been received for the extension to the plumbing workshop and are currently being evaluated.

PNG Campus

The increased power consumption caused by the extra eighty boarders and the operation of the hospitality facility has required an upgrade the campus back-up power system from 250 kva to 400-450 kva to carry the load during the frequent mains power outages in Port Moresby.

3.8 Cross Cutting Implementation

APTC staff are apprised of all relevant cross-cutting issues upon induction and orientation, including disability issues, gender appropriateness and cultural awareness. All APTC marketing information upholds cross-cutting principles and utilises electronic and printed communication that encourage its promotion.

Student recruitment processes also include mechanisms to target disadvantaged sectors of communities across the Pacific.

3.9 Alumni

Activities and goals in the Alumni Strategy have been implemented. Some activities are on-going:

- ▶ Alumni Facebook "likes" have reached more than 1000. Regular updates including employment opportunities, graduates stories, profiles, and Alumni/Chapter activities are posted on the Alumni Facebook page
- Alumni LinkedIn page for professional development and networking has been created and employment opportunities are posted
- The first edition of the 2015 Alumni newsletter was published in June 2015
- Alumni status and contact details are updated on CRM for all new graduates, using the details from the Graduate Register. Alumni contact details are also updated on CRM using online form submissions
- Currently AGMs/Elections are being organised to elect new Chapter Leadership Committees

Alumni Activities:

Fiji

- Donation drive for Labasa School of Special Education. A total of \$1,010 was collected from food sales and an angle grinder was donated to the School
- ▶ Donation drive for children's items which were donated to St. Minas Children's Home in the West and St. Christopher's in Suva
- Donation drive for blankets for the Golden Age Home in Lautoka. Blankets were much needed by the residents of the Golden Age Home as the country is going through its winter season
- DFAT organised an Alumni networking event in Suva in June and APTC graduates were eligible to attend. More than one hundred graduates expressed interest, however due to space limitations, only twenty graduates were able to attend. This event was very successful and the enthusiasm of and commitment to APTC by our alumni was note by the organisers.

Samoa

- Around thirty alumni and their families participated in the clean-up of Mount Vaea, an historical site in Samoa
- Alumni conducted an Ava ceremony to welcome students in February 2015, and another ceremony to farewell the outgoing Country Manager, (Francis Howes) and welcome the new Country Manager (Pat Vella)

Shirley has gone from Youth Worker to CEO in a short period of time and has completed both the Certificate IV in Youth Work and the Diploma of Management at APTC. Shirley competed for the position with both national and international applicants
- Vanuatu Tourism Awards for Excellence winners, Sam Andikar and Warren Gama
- ▶ Erick Seliato, Certificate III in Tourism promoted from marketing officer to Manager Sales and Marketing of the Samoa Tourism Authority
- ▶ Florence Thomas, Certificate III in Hospitality and Certificate IV in Hospitality Supervision graduate was sponsored by an Australian family to work in the industry and to study the Diploma in Hospitality Management. Florence is currently in Tasmania

SECTION 4.0 COMMUNICATIONS AND PUBLIC RELATIONS

(Scope of Services 5.2, 5.3)

4.1 Highlights

During this reporting period there have been a number of events highlighting APTC achievements:

- APTC graduates featured in the Vanuatu Tourism Awards for Excellence. Graduate Warren Gamma won "Best Tour Guide" while Sam Andikar won a Judges' Special Commendation award for his Millennium Cave Tours operation
- The Prime Minister of Samoa was the Keynote Speaker at the Samoa graduation ceremony this semester. He spoke strongly about the value of APTC. In part of his speech he said:

This is a huge milestone not only for Samoa but for our Pacific Islands men and women who are educated and have the opportunity to gain Australian standards, skills and qualifications which has given them a very wide benefit of education and careers in the Pacific. This complements the Samoa Government's vision of ensuring that its people have opportunities for training which will inevitably ensure growth of our country

- Samoa campus cookery students competed in the National Birthday Cake competition and their cakes won the first and third prizes. The cakes were judged for taste, design and creativity. Both cakes were delivered to the Head of State, Prime Minister and Cabinet Ministers for their morning tea
- APTC student Samuel Fido won the inaugural Samoa National Welding competition, while an APTC student currently studying in Samoa placed third. The top three winners received a welding kit from the competition's major sponsor BOC, with many other businesses donating prizes for competitors
- ▶ APTC Samoa cookery and hospitality students and staff cooked for and provided service for more than one hundred and forty guests at the Australian High Commissioner's residence on the evening of ANZAC day.

4.2 Communications

Media activities are monitored and a register is kept for media mentions across the campus and non-campus countries. The revision of the role of Marketing and Media Officer to Communications Officer has supported the move to a stronger focus on communications and media placement. A central activity in communications planning has centred on upgrading branding of existing promotional collateral. The eScan 2015 has been produced with an improved design and is targeting a broader external audience.

Previously perceived risks around approvals processes and timeliness have been mitigated through a revision of media strategies, the introduction of a media invite and closer media monitoring and liaison with both local and regional media. All significant events since the beginning of the year have encountered over 50% increase in reach following publication. Press releases are being coordinated and sent out within 24 hours of all events and media response has improved.

Plans are underway to revise the existing Communications Strategy in line with contractual requirements beyond June 2015.

4.3 Media and PR Activity

Forty-nine media articles, including fifteen web stories promoting student activities and campus events, have been released and have been uploaded onto the APTC Internet site in this period.

While the Samoa campus continues to enjoy a very positive relationship with local media, in particular the Samoa Observer, media reach and presence in Fiji, Vanuatu and the Solomon Islands has increased by over fifty percent.

The thirteen APTC videos on YouTube have had 808 views to date.


The End of Course Learner surveys continue to be undertaken with all completing classes and a compilation of data from the surveys for the January – June period is contained within this report.

The 2015 Graduate Student Tracer Survey and the 2015 Employer Survey have not yet been conducted in anticipation of changed M&E requirements under the new SoS. The development of the M&E Framework has commenced. It is envisaged that there will be a change to the survey methodology, survey tools and reporting on completion of the M&E Framework. The completed reports will be supplied to DFAT within the required timelines.

5.1 Student Activity Data

Delivery of courses in Stage 2 (1 July 2011 – 30 June 2015) was planned with a graduate target of 3450 specified in the SoS. The target increased over the life of the project to 4200. It is anticipated that APTC will achieve more than 4500 at the close of results 30 June 2015. Exact graduate numbers will not be known until all awards have been verified by issuing RTOs.

The following analysis provides an update from the information provided in the Quarterly Activity Report for the period January - March 2015. A compilation of the outcomes and the supporting data tables for the period to 30 June 2015 are contained in the tables in Annex 2.0.




5.1.1 Cumulative Enrolment Results (Annex 2.0 – Table 1)

In total 10041 students have been enrolled into APTC programs to date; 4437 in Stage 1 and 5604 in Stage 2. The total enrolments for Stage 2 represent an increase of 1167 in this reporting period. Overall the gender balance of enrolments stands at 40% females and 60% males. In Stage 1 females accounted for 36% of all enrolments; for Stage 2 females represent 42% of all enrolments to date.

In terms of scholarship enrolments; 74% of the students enrolled are APTC scholarship recipients. The gender balance amongst APTC scholarship students is 42% female and 58% male. In Stage 1, 41% of all scholarship awardees enrolled were females; for Stage 2 females represent 42% of all scholarship awardees to date.

Non-scholarship students in Stage 2 are predominantly employer funded by industry with the remainder being self or privately funded.



5.1.2 Graduate Outcomes (Annex 2.0 – Table 2)

In total 8445 students have graduated from APTC programs to date; 3562 in Stage 1 and 4883 in Stage 2. The overall gender balance of graduates is 40% females and 60% males. In Stage 1, females accounted for 39% of all graduates; for Stage 2 females have represented 41% of all graduates to date. In the six month period January – June 2015, 395 students have graduated from APTC, whilst 619 have been enrolled and 46 scholarship students have been mobilised.

In terms of scholarships 72% of all graduates were recipients of an APTC scholarship in Stages 1 and 2. For Stage 1, 74% of graduates were scholarship recipients whilst for Stage 2, 76% of the graduates were scholarship recipients. Females account for 42% of all scholarship graduates - 43% in Stage 1 and 42% in Stage 2 to date.

5.1.3 Graduate Employment and Destination Outcomes (Annex 2.0 – Table 3a)

Overall 165 graduates have migrated from their countries of residence/citizenship following completion of their study with APTC.

In Stage 2, there have been 80 graduate migrations recorded to date, with graduates from Samoa comprising 28% and Fiji 31% of all migrations. The most popular destinations are New Zealand (35%), Australia (19%) and the United States of America (4%).

5.1.4 Migrated Graduate Qualifications (Annex 2.0 – Table 3b)

The highest numbers of migrants in Stage 2 are graduates of the Certificate III in Hospitality (16%) and Certificate III in Hospitality (Patisserie) (12%), then Certificate III in Disability (10%), Certificate III in Early Childhood Education and Care (10%) and Certificate III in Hospitality (Commercial Cookery) (8%) and the Certificate III in Hairdressing (8%). These courses collectively represent 64% of all migrations in Stage 2.

5.1.5 Scholarship and Non-Scholarship Applications (Annex 2.0 – Table 4)

In total 18417 students have applied for a scholarship award to assist with the costs of studying at APTC; 9025 in Stage 1 and 9212 in Stage 2. Overall the gender balance of applications is 42% females and 58% males. A further 1325 applicants in Stage 1 and 2367 applicants in Stage 2 did not record a scholarship preference in their applications.

In APTC Stage 1, females accounted for 39% of all applicants; in Stage 2 females represent 40% of all applicants. The campus countries generally recorded higher numbers of applications with Fiji leading the list in both stages.

5.1.6 Scholarship Mobilisations (Annex 2.0 - Table 5)

4987 students have been mobilised in Stage 2, accounting for 66% of all APTC mobilisations to date. Of these, 31% are female.

5.1.7 Scholarship Non-Mobilisations (Annex 2.0 – Table 6a)

In total 1948 scholarships award recipients have not mobilised to commence study in an APTC program to date; 260 in Stage 1 and 1688 in Stage 2. Reasons provided for non-mobilisation include declining the scholarship offer, not presenting for mobilisation and applicants who deferred study on more than one occasion. Overall, females accounted for 31% of the non-mobilisation of scholarship awards; Stage 1 - 23%, Stage 2 - 32% to date.

5.1.8 Scholarship Non-Completions (Annex 2.0 – Table 6b)

In total 556 APTC scholarship award recipients started their respective courses but did not complete them; 322 in Stage 1 and 234 in Stage 2 to date. Students were recorded as non-complete due to expulsion, personal reasons, ill health or non-progression in study. Overall, females accounted for 37% of the recorded non-completions after enrolment/mobilisation for scholarship awardees; Stage 1 - 40%, Stage 2 - 32% to date.

5.2 Student Satisfaction Surveys

5.2.1 APTC Graduate Student Tracer Survey and the Employer Survey

The APTC Graduate Student Tracer Survey and the Employer Survey for 2015 is yet to be implemented. The results from the 2014 surveys were reported in the Annual Report and Plan 2014 – 2015, submitted in January 2015.

In summary the analysis revealed a slight increase to ninety-seven percent for overall student satisfaction with APTC training, up from the ninety-five percent recorded in the 2013 survey. Overall, APTC training increased graduates' employability, earning capacity, self-confidence and their ability to influence workplace performance and productivity.

This semester the Vanuatu Community Development delivery team followed the progress of a previous class, and was able to confirm that all graduates of the first cohort of the Certificate IV in Community Development have secured employment.

5.2.2 APTC End of Course Learner Surveys

Results from the End of Course Learner (EoCL) surveys conducted since January 2015 show an overall satisfaction rate with APTC training of ninety-two percent and eighty-eight percent satisfaction with the quality of student support services.

The level of response achieved represents a one hundred percent survey completion rate. The courses analysed after survey are listed below:

5.3 Training Profile Research and Planning

5.3.1 Demand Driven Training and TVET Delivery

The APTC Training Profile (TP) for semester 1 2015 was planned to complete every enrolled student in any APTC course by 30 June 2015, as this was the contracted Stage 2 end date. The profile plan was to enrol 488 students and graduate 947 students across both schools by the end of the financial year. The actual number of students enrolled in APTC courses this semester was 619, and the actual number who are expected to graduate is 959.

Extensive desk top research and in-country industry consultation have been conducted across campus countries. The information from this work will be used to develop a demand-driven training profile. The updated training profile will inform the delivery mix for APTC, and will be updated annually.

SECTION 6.0 RISK MANAGEMENT

(Scope of Services 5.2, 5.3, 16.2(b) (viii))

6.1 Business Risk

A revised APTC Risk Management Plan was presented in the APTC Annual Report and Plan 2014 – 2015, and was further updated at the LT meeting in February 2015. The current plan identifies risk levels and assigns responsibility for actions emanating from evaluation of the plan.

As APTC moves into the Stage 2 Extension, the Risk Management Plan will be adapted to reflect the requirements of the SoS and the final M&E Framework

6.2 Environmental and Physical Risk

A review of all APTC safety handbooks occurred during this period. Revised staff contact lists for all locations continue to be issued to all staff via the email network on a monthly basis.

The recent cyclone in Vanuatu tested the APTC emergency tree procedures, with all staff reported safe throughout the event. APTC's swift response to the devastation, and the effort in getting power and communications restored in a short period of time is to be commended.

SECTION 7.0 FINANCIAL REPORTING

7.1 Financial Management Information System

Quarterly Reports required during this period have been completed and submitted to DFAT. Reports include forecast of invoicing and claims. Financial reporting has been provided on time and in accordance with client requirements. Information captures progress on project expenditure, forecasted expenditure and details within the Basis of Payment.

Reporting at a campus level is now provided monthly along with regular finance meetings with individual members.

A system to reconcile open invoices is in place to ensure that all debt is paid.

The Manager Finance is ensuring that all student invoices on the system are brought up to date by the end of this financial year.

7.2 Major Procurements

During this six month period the following procurement has been undertaken:

- automotive and diesel training simulators for Fiji & PNG campuses
- replacement and upgrade of generator for PNG campus backup power
- student bus for PNG campus (replacement of existing small van)
- replacement of main printer for PNG campus and additional printer for in-house student resource printing
- courier van to assist with pickup of supplies for all areas (replacement of sedan to be used for student exercise)
- replacement of two fleet vehicles in PNG (replacement of utilities with wagons for better practicality)
- four diesel engines on stands for student training
- replacement of oven and deep fryer at Samoa training restaurant due to items being beyond economical repair
- replacement of two fleet vehicles in Samoa
- replacement of servers at key sites
- replacement of fleet vehicles in Fiji
- video and audio conferencing equipment for all sites
